THIS MAY SAVE YOUR LIFE

Please take the time to read this. I know you are smart enough to know these pointers, but there will be somewhere you will go "Hmm, I must remember that." After reading, please copy and send this to someone you care about. It never hurts to be careful in this crazy world we live in.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MINUTES - MAY 6, 2003

The Junior League of Boca Raton, Inc.'s Meeting of the Board of Directors was called to order by President Cynthia Krebsbach at 7:35 p.m., Tuesday, May 6, 2003. Attending: Cindy Krebsbach, Carolyn Arnold, Ingrid Kennemer, Ann Schauer, Sharon McGuire, Kris Killip, Kathy Adkins, Lisa Warren, Jeanne Brander, Lisa Mulhall, Linda Halstead, Dorothy MacDiarmid. Consent Agenda: April Board Minutes, February and March financial statement, personnel changes as contained in the packet. Cindy Krebsbach moved that the Consent Agenda be passed, it was seconded by Carolyn Arnold. Motion passes. Communications Council: Ingrid Kennemer makes a request that all web site changes go through the Communications Council. Planning Council: Kathy Adkins reports that Funding the Future raised approx. \$18,000 from the Carl's Social. New donations totaling \$110,000. The League is on track to have building finished by December 2003. Planning Council suggests that in the future the board revisit the original intent of making a percentage donation to the Funding the Future endowment or future operations. Endowments should be researched by next years' councils on how other

Leagues and non-profits operate and fund their endowments. Personnel Council: Kris Killip gave a N/P update on filling the remaining openings. Kris Killip moved that all membership status changes be due by March 1st of the calendar year. It was seconded by Lisa Warren. Motion passed. Kris Killip moved that the Board of Directors approve Rebecca Brown for active membership in the Junior League of Boca Raton. Motion was seconded and passed. Kris Killip moved that the following member of the Junior League of Boca Raton be approved to change the status from active to sustaining: Janet Bridges. Motion was seconded and passed. Kris Killip moved the Board of Directors approve the creation on an Annual Award Selection Committee and to make recommendations to the Board of Directors on Honorary Membership and other matters. This Committee would be comprised of the President, President-Elect, Nominating/ Placement Chair, Nominating/ Placement Chair-Elect and the Sustaining Advisor. Motion was seconded by Kathy Adkins and passed. Kris Killip moved that Arlette Baker be made an Honorary Member of the JLBR. Motion was seconded by Lisa Mulhall and passed. Finance Council: Sharon McGuire moved that Schmidt, Raines, Trieste, Dickenson & Adams do the 2003-2004 audit and tax filling. Motion was seconded by Carolyn Arnold. Motion passed. The fee for services will be \$7,500. The firm will make an in kind donation of \$2,500 leaving \$5,000 for the League fee. Community Council: Community Council moves that a policy addition to page E-63: I.C. We would add #2. Grant writing efforts for community projects are encouraged. Grant Applications written for programs or equipment budgeted in the community project contract will supplant the current budget and will not increase the total amount of funding to the project unless prior Board approval has been received. Grant applications written for programs or equipment not currently in the community project contract require Board approval prior to submission due to the additional funding and manpower that will be required to administer the additional programming. Motion was seconded by Ingrid Kennemer. Motion passed. Community Support Fund update: Summerbridge Program at St. Andrews School received a \$500 grant for its summer program for underprivileged children. Old Business: Discussion on Honorary Chair for Woman Volunteer of the Year. There being no further business, meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m.

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES - MAY 13, 2003

The Junior League of Boca Raton, Inc.'s General Membership meeting was called to order by President Cynthia Krebsbach at 7:00 p.m., Tuesday, May 13, 2003. Consent Agenda included the minutes of the General Membership meeting for April 2003 and the February 2003 and March 2003 Financial Statements. A motion was made to accept the Consent Agenda. Motion was seconded and passed. President's Remarks: Cindy welcomed everyone and expressed appreciation. Robin Deyo and Emily McMullin gave a PowerPoint presentation recapping the highlights of the 2002 - 2003 League Year. Kathy Adkins, VP of Planning Council, introduced our community partners: Howard Olshansky (Children's Place at Home Safe), Allyson Dupree Smith (Community Foundation of Palm Beach and Martin Counties), Toni Williams-Gary (Non-profit Resource Institute) and Joanne Chester Bander (Donor's Forum). Kathy Adkins thanked Arlette Baker for the success of the Carl's Spring Social with Martha Stewart. Over \$18,000 was raised thanks to Carl's underwriting. Pattie Damron announced that the demolition and construction of the Vegso Resource Center would soon be underway. Pattie introduced Gail Butler of AutoNation, who presented a check for \$25,000 in support of the Capital Campaign. Pattie also introduced Tom Scheidel of Wachovia Bank who presented a check for \$25,000 as well. Pattie announced that the following have given their financial support to the Capital Campaign: Osborne Family Foundation \$10,000, Toppel Family Foundation \$10,000, Cobb Family Foundation \$50,000, AutoNation \$25,000. Johanna Felberbaum, Chair of the 2003 Women Volunteer of The Year Luncheon, announced that the date has been set for October 30, 2003 and that Saks Fifth Avenue will be our partner. Countess de Hoernle will be our Honorary Chair for the luncheon. It was announced that Pattie Damron would be the JLBR nominee for Woman Volunteer of the Year. Jami Guttenberg announced that Stacy Lovit won the award for completing the most DIADs. Kristen Ross and Chrissy Biagiotti presented the caregivers PSA that JLBR has produced and explained that a televised support group is now on BRET TV. Nick

It was suggested that this motion go back to Community Council for that council's recommendation. Consent agenda was amended to delete the Community Council Grant writing motion.
